A Message from the President:

Dear Friends,

In January of this year I stepped into the role of Board President of the Hunger Task Force. Joanne Stephens retired at the end of 2018 after 3 years as President so she can spend more time with her family. In this short space I cannot adequately express our great appreciation for the contributions she has made to our organization and to the fight against hunger. While stepping down as President, she is still committed to our mission and will continue to share her time and talents with us as a board member.

As our local economy continues to flourish it is disappointing that so many of our neighbors and friends still suffer from a food shortage. The number of food pantries and meal sites that the HTF supports grew from 100 in 2017 to 116 by the end of 2018. In 2018 we collected, warehoused and distributed over 1,540,700 pounds of free food to 116 food programs within a 100 mile radius of La Crosse. Our Kane Street garden recorded another successful year providing 28,893 pounds of fresh produce.

The Hunger Task Force Board of Directors continues to search for new ways to raise the finances to support this continued growth. As a 501©3 organization we receive no government support and rely solely upon the generosity of donors and volunteers and the hard work of a small but dedicated staff. 2019 promises to provide new challenges, but with your help and the help of many people just like you, the HTF will continue to harvest community resources and provide free food to all of the deserving clients at the meal sites and food pantries across the Coulee Region.



The Kane Street Community Garden

- In 2018, 28,893 pounds of produce were grown in the garden.
- 4,787 volunteer visits
- 16.8 lbs. average per recipient
- 1,250 unique volunteers
- 7,821 volunteer hours
- 25 Children's and Adult workshops given with 169 participants
- Partnering with others, the garden was able to secure and distribute nearly 34,227 additional pounds of food to low income individuals and families through outreach sites
- Surplus produce not given out at the garden was distributed through The Food Recovery Program to the 100+ partner programs The Hunger Task Force Food Recovery Program serves.
